City Church of Richmond A Brief History

FALL 2007

We were welcoming about 30 worshippers per week, and few local pastors began helping out with worship.

JULY 2008

Erik Bonkovsky was hired as churchplanting pastor.

MARCH 2009

We changed our name to City Church of Richmond to better align our identity with our mission and vision.

We moved our worship space to Congregation Beth Ahabah, to better accommodate our growing church.

FEBRUARY 2011

We moved our worship (and office) space to Grace Covenant Presbyterian Church, 1627 Monument Avenue.

JUNE 2013

FALL 2006

City Church's first service (then called Franklin Street Community or FSC) was held at Harvest Renewal Church, led by Steve Constable, senior pastor at Stony Point Reformed Presbyterian Church.

WINTER 2007

FSC became an official PCA church plant and commissioned a search team to find a pastor.

SEPTEMBER 2008

We received our first members— 23. to be exact.

City Church was particularized, meaning we had our own pastor and ordained elders who were elected by the church to shepherd its people.

JANUARY 2011

We ordained our first deacons who were elected by the church to care for its physical and tangible needs.





2020 Goals

As we look back on how God was faithful to City Church in 2019, it's important to also look forward and establish goals for how we will steward all we've been given. This year we're hoping to...

- Welcome at least 30 new communing members (including 5 professions of faith) to our roll by January 2021.
- See three additional nursery volunteers serving each Sunday.
- Have 75% of our members involved in service each semester, including two church-wide service opportunities (e.g. A Night to Shine RVA).



 Increase participation in Christian Formation (Sunday Formation, City Groups, and Bible studies).



- Establish two new City Groups: one in Church Hill and one south of the river.
- Explore community-friendly (i.e. outward-facing) class offerings.
- Continue parental involvement in City Kids-related activities.
- Bring in \$652,824.00 in offerings for the 2019-2020 fiscal year.
- Encourage 100% giving participation from all members and regular attenders.
- Send out \$137,093.00 to our ministry partners during the 2019-2020 fiscal year.
